

IDRF Program supports the next generation of scholars in the humanities and humanistic social sciences pursuing research that advances knowledge about non-US cultures and societies. The program is open to a range of methodologies, including research in archives and manuscript collections, fieldwork and surveys, and quantitative data collection.

Eligibility: The program is open to graduate students in the humanities and humanistic social sciences - regardless of citizenship - enrolled in Ph.D. programs in the United States. Applicants must complete all Ph.D. requirements except on-site research by the time the fellowship begins. Proposals that identify the United States as a case for comparative inquiry are welcome; however, proposals which focus predominantly or exclusively on the United States are not eligible.

Terms: The program provides support for 9-12 months of dissertation research. Applicants from select humanities disciplines are eligible to apply for a shorter international component within the 9-12 months of support. Fellowship amounts vary, depending on research plan, with a per-fellowship average of \$21,000.
