

Call for Papers: Interdisciplinary Graduate Conference on “Resistance, Rebellion, and Revolution.”

The Stony Brook University History Graduate Student Association will host its second annual interdisciplinary conference on **Saturday, April 7, 2018**. Graduate students from all fields are invited to submit paper or panel proposals related to the theme of **Resistance, Rebellion, and Revolution**.

We are honored to welcome **Heather Gautney** as our keynote speaker this year. Heather Gautney is an associate professor of sociology at Fordham University, and is a senior policy advisor to Senator Bernie Sanders. She has written books, articles, and opinion essays on U.S. politics, social movements, and global inequality, and appeared in broadcast interviews for a variety of domestic and international media outlets. Her book on the 2016 presidential election and Sanders campaign, called *Crashing the Party*, will be released this May. She is currently working on another book titled *The New Power Elite*, a remake of C. Wright Mills’ classic.

Accepted applicants will be asked to submit their full papers two weeks before the conference.
